Course Objectives / Learning Outcomes

This course introduces students to the concepts, programming skills, and tools related to design and develop websites. The topics include website layout; creating tables, frames, menus and forms; presenting multimedia on web pages; and Internet Protocols such as HTTP and FTP. Students gain hands-on programming experience in designing websites using HTML and Cascading Style Sheets.

This course focuses on HTML and CSS; therefore, students must refrain from including any scripting language, e.g. JavaScript, in the assignments. No extra marks will be given, and scripts may be subject to removal.

^{*}A minimum of 20% of the work on which the final grade is based will be evaluated and available to the student before the voluntary withdrawal date.

- Students are responsible to review their assignments before submissions to make sure the correct files are submitted.
- Programming assignments can be very time-consuming. Please start early.
- Students are responsible for backing up and protecting their assignment work.

Therefore, such practice is considered not acceptable and could be handled as an act of academic misconduct. Students can create their own templates for their own use in assignments/projects. All HTML/CSS code used in such template(s) must be written by the student themselves.
